Working overseas in Indonesia with Adelaide's Craniofacial Surgical Team.

Hello, my name is Cathy Cross and the newest member of SAPNA's committee 2025.

Some of you will recognise me, as I've been on the committee before a few years back, and I've worked within the Perioperative nursing field for more than 30 years, both in private and public.





I have specialised over the years with Plastics and Craniofacial, and since 2012 I have been travelling overseas to Indonesia, working with Adelaide's Craniofacial Consultants, to teach and support our international colleagues.

Currently I am working at the RAH in the Technical Suites, and working overseas once a year supported by OSSAA, *Overseas Specialist Surgical Association of Australia*.

This report details the work that Dr. Walter Flapper and Nurse Cathy Cross conducted during a recent trip to Indonesia 2024, specifically Jakarta and Manado. We were first invited to the region in 2012 by Dr. Mendy Oley, the only Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeon for North Sulawesi, and her husband Dr. Maxi Oley, a Neurosurgeon. This visit in 2023 is the first time we have been back since Covid and 2021.

Since 2012, we have visited every year, teaching, and supporting both the surgical doctors and nurses of Siloam Private Hospital and Kandou Public Hospital.

Jakarta Craniofacial Patient Clinics were established by Professor David David and we have continued to provide service and support to these patients.

Our visits are planned out to include running patient clinics where we usually see past patients for ongoing reviews and surgical planning and new patients, surgical procedures both planned and trauma cases.

The Craniofacial patients typically have syndromic conditions such as-

- Hemifacial Microsomia
- Crouzon Syndrome
- Apert Syndrome
- Cohen Syndrome
- Rare Tessier Clefts

Craniofacial surgeons work closely with multidisciplinary teams to individually plan and coordinate each patient's surgical journey as they grow and mature to ensure the best outcome for each patient. This is an important part of sharing knowledge and experience with the Indonesian Surgeons to impart the surgical protocols used to map out each patients planned surgery as they grow, during these clinics.

Follow up appointments included-

- Orthodontics
- Physio
- ENT or Orthopaedics
- CT and MRI scans
- Ophthalmologist

Future surgical plans and scheduling included-

- Lefort 1 and 3 procedures
- Malocclusion and Apnoea concerns
- Rhinoplasty and Rib Graft
- Abbe flap
- Canthopexy
- Bimaxillary Advancement


Kandou General Hospital theatre environment has improved dramatically since 2018 and 2019. The theatres have been renovated with the installation of booms that convey power outlets as opposed to multiple power packs and extension cords traversing the theatre floor. They are cleaner, have easier access to surgical instrumentation and consumables. In the past I was required to scrub as the primary scrub nurse to assist Dr. Flapper and Dr. Mendy, but I was inspired to see that my influence and education has made in roads to the theatre staff, and I was only required to guide and translate in many instances. The nurses

whom I have worked with in Siloam Private Hospital also work in Kandou theatres. My main teaching areas then focused on sustainable and realistic clinical techniques and safety. Safe sharps management, manual handling techniques and pre-emptive and intuitive instrument nurse clinical skills.

Interesting how they adapt with a lack of consumable choices. The nurses created a 'guarded diathermy tip' by cutting the very end of the plastic sleeve that covers the spatula tip, thus achieving the very same guarded diathermy tip.

Surgical Time Out or Surgical Safety Check is conducted between all the staff, and they pray for the patient, with heads bowed. The difference being their patient is already asleep, anaesthetised, whereas our patients actively participate in surgical time out and vocalise with their name, date of birth, surgical procedure and allergies.

This visit has been very insightful into the benefits of regular and sustainable surgical clinics in Indonesia. We are seeing a large growth in plastic surgery surgical trainees across Indonesia, and a growing population to sustain them in the Craniofacial surgical specialty with trauma and syndromic birth defects and the necessary surgical interventions. We are now teaching another generation from the years of visiting and passing our skills and knowledge to the colleagues we meet and work alongside in the operating theatres of Indonesia.

As a reminder, members with a minimum of two years' membership are eligible to apply for study grants to support their educational pursuits.




Behind the Mask: Showcasing our Teams

Western Adelaide Private Hospital has recently emerged from a lengthy administration period and is now under the new ownership of a dedicated

group of doctors and Amplar Health. This transition marks the beginning of an exciting new chapter for both the hospital and its perioperative team.

Amidst these changes, one of the most significant developments is the opening of Theatre 4—a brand-new, state-of-the-art facility purpose-built as a dedicated orthopaedic theatre. Member Survey Summary & 2025 Planning


