

I started my nursing career straight out of school in 1990 at the RAH. I was lucky to be in the last year of hospital-based nursing - I was group 902. That year there were 6 groups of students and from memory there were about 200 places with around 3000 applications. I completed my training in Feb 1993. Competition for GNP programs was hard, and I was lucky to get a GNP place at the Women's & Children's Hospital for July that year. I did 6mths of agency nursing seeing the other side. I enjoyed my time at the W&CH, but found the hardest part was not the children, but dealing with the parents. As one does when their contract is coming up, I applied for a position at the RAH. During my 3yrs training we all did a stint in the OR. I did enjoy my time in theatres and my performance review was obviously positive enough for me to get an interview. I was a young 21yr old nurse and keen to learn. I was given an interview with Judith Berry who had lined me up for a position that was going in the Cardiothoracic Theatres. I met with Judith and was then taken over to the East wing to meet with Von Cummings the CNC of Cardiac Theatres. As anyone that is looking for a permeant job does, I was thinking if I get the job and hate it, I can always move once I am in the system. I was offered the job, but my dilemma was that I still had 4 months to go on my GNP at the W&CH but the RAH wanted me to start straight away. So, I resigned from GNP place to start in theatres at the RAH. I commenced with the obligatory 3-month rotation introduction to the OR, 1 month in OR, 1 Month in Anaes and 1 month in Rec - then I was off to Cardiac theatres. For me this was such an opportunity and I loved working in the cardiothoracic theatres. I spent 4 yrs working in Cardiac theatres until I got the Clinical Nurse job in the Flinders Medical Centre Cardio Thoracic Theatres. This for me was a great opportunity to expand my skills and included teaching. I loved the work, the people, and the experiences. I then got married and started a family and made the tough choice to resign my position to focus on my family. During this time between kids - I have 4 of them-I did go back and do agency work doing Anaesthetic Nursing. This was a great opportunity to get out of the house and regain my skills. Agency nursing takes a lot of courage as you are constantly having to learn new hospital procedures, equipment, computer programs and paperwork! I have now been working agency for the last 15 yrs and love the flexibility, variety and challenges that agency brings. It also suits my life now.

My other passion is SAPNA. I joined SAPNA when I started in Cardio Thoracic Theatres at the RAH in 1994. I joined the committee a few years later and have been involved ever since. In 2009 I was awarded life membership. Over the years I have done most positions on the committee and for the last 10 yrs have been involved in the conference side. This is something that I really enjoy seeing an event come together. There is so much work that goes into these events and it is a mammoth task undertaken by the committee, but everyone works together to make the event happen.
